National Children's Memorial Day, December 13th

In May of 2003, a Private Member's Motion put forth by Labrador MP Lawrence O'Brien was passed by the House of Commons designating the second Sunday of December as National Children's Memorial Day. It was approved unanimously. The suggestion originated with Betty and Dennis Normore in memory of their daughter Paula who died in a snow-mobile accident in January 2001. This event occurs on the same day as the Worldwide Candle Lighting: "That Their Light May Always Shine"

TCF Worldwide Candle Lighting December 13

Held annually on the second Sunday in December, The Compassionate Friends Worldwide Candle Lighting unites families and friends around the globe as they light candles for one hour to honour and remember children who have died at any age, from any cause. As candles are lit at 7 p.m. local time, thousands of people commemorate and honour children in a way that transcends all ethnic, cultural, religious and political boundaries.

Believed to be the largest mass candle-lighting on the globe, the Worldwide Candle Lighting creates a virtual 24-hour wave of light as it moves from time zone to time zone. Hundreds of formal candle-lighting events are held and thousands of informal candle lightings are conducted in homes as families gather in quiet remembrance of children who have died, but who will never be forgotten.


The Worldwide Candle Lighting started in the United States in 1997 as a small internet observance but has since swelled in numbers as word has spread throughout the world. A memorial message board is available during the event at TCF USA's website:
