TCF National Financial Summary

The Compassionate Friends of Canada National Board has continued to build the organization with limited financial means. We reduce operating costs wherever possible and closely watch our expenditures to ensure they are directed to providing the best support for our Chapters across the country.

In the fiscal year ending March 31, 2018, our revenues were \$4,893, comprising individual and chapter donations, income from the Gathering in Medicine Hat in August 2017 and interest from the Gwen Brown Endowment Fund. Our expenses were \$1,707 comprising telecommunications (1-800 line and Board teleconferences), website support and administration costs. Since future revenues are not guaranteed, we continue to look for ways to contain our costs, but recognize that certain expenditures are necessary in order to provide a basic level of service. Please consider whether you or your Chapter would be able to contribute to the work of the national organization, either directly or in-kind. Your support would be greatly appreciated.

She's on a corner lot just a couple of blocks off a main road, near a shopping centre. Location, location, location! Chapter members and other supporters could drop things off at Louise's place, or they could bring them to the monthly sharing meeting the week before the sale. It took just a few dedicated helpers to set up early on the day, monitor the tables, and then take down in the afternoon. The take? Substantial. Thanks from the Victoria Chapter to Louise and her crew.

The Morgoch Family, Generous Winnipeg Benefactors

Johnny and Sharon Morgoch are bereaved parents, although they never came out to TCF meetings. They approached TCF Winnipeg in December 2003, wanting to do a fundraiser for TCF in memory of their daughter Candace. As they had been involved with car shows, they would do a Show and Shine. The first event had about 76 vehicles, was held on their acreage and raised \$5000. (The most successful fundraiser TCF Winnipeg had, to that date, was a garage sale that raised \$1200.) Last year's show had over 500 vehicles, was held on the Selkirk waterfront and docks and raised \$14,000 for TCF Winnipeg. In the beginning, ALL the volunteers were their friends and family. Maurice and Dolores Belot were the only TCF volunteers at the first one, staffing a display table with TCF information. It took quite a few years before other members got involved with the work or even came out to the event, but now Maurice and Dolores are there at 5:30 a.m. helping to set up tents, tables, etc., with probably another 15 or 20 TCF members. The event now includes a live band, Tribute to Patsy Cline, fantastic silent auction, engine blow-up (50/50), commemorative T-shirts, hot dogs from Skinner's, root beer floats from A&W and ice cream treats from Dairy Queen. But the Morgoch family and friends do ALL of the planning and preparation. A few TCF volunteers do some work prior to the event, but very little. What a tremendous gift to the community from this generous family. (Maybe the Rolling Stones were correct that sometimes "you get what you need".)
